FORMER CHIEF OF FIRE DEPT. DIES

Charles M. Arthur Expires Early Wednesday After 5-Week Illness

SERVED FOR 26 YEARS

Named Chief in 1905 in the Days When Horses Draw the Equipment

Ex-Fire Chief Charles M. Arthur, for years a familiar figure on the city's fire department, passed away at 2:45 o'clock Wednesday morning in his home, 331 South Blanchard street, following an illness of two years. Embolism was the cause of death.

Retired 16 Years: Upon his retirement 16 years ago he was succeeded by Chief Ray Long, who recently tendered his resignation to the city.

His services on the fire department dated back to the days of horse-drawn fire wagons. The shiny brass pumper belching smoke and the clatter of the horses' hooves never failed to attract the attention of passers-by.

Mr. Arthur was born July 11, 1865, in Medina, the son of Albert and Betty (Graham) Arthur. When he was a small boy, his family moved to Wood county and he later came back to Findlay in 1882.

Last of Big Family: He was the last of nine brothers and sisters and is survived by one daughter, Miss Lulu Arthur, at home. He leaves a number of nieces and nephews.

It was Betty Again: About two hours later while on the set for "There's Magic in Music" who should come up the aisle but little Betty Brewer arm in arm with one of the extra girls. On spying me she pulled her friend over, saying, "Have you met Howard?"

WASHINGTON, July 31.—(AP)—President Roosevelt has selected 50-year-old Rep. Lindsay Warren, of North Carolina, one of his close congressional consultants, to be comptroller-general. He will succeed former Senator Fred Brown, of New Hampshire, who retired because of ill health.

NEGRO KILLS 2 DURING BATTLE TO EVICT HIM

BOISE, Idaho, July 31.—(AP)—A four-hour siege by gunfire and dynamite brought death today to a Negro hermit who slew two federal officers rather than give up his isolated mountain cabin. More than a score of persons poured hundreds of rounds from machine guns, sawed off shotguns and riot guns into the timber-surrounded hut which Pearl Royal Hendrickson refused to give up to the government. U. S. Marshal George A. Mefan, 53, and John Glenn, 42-year-old deputy, died in a futile effort to dislodge the husky Negro.
