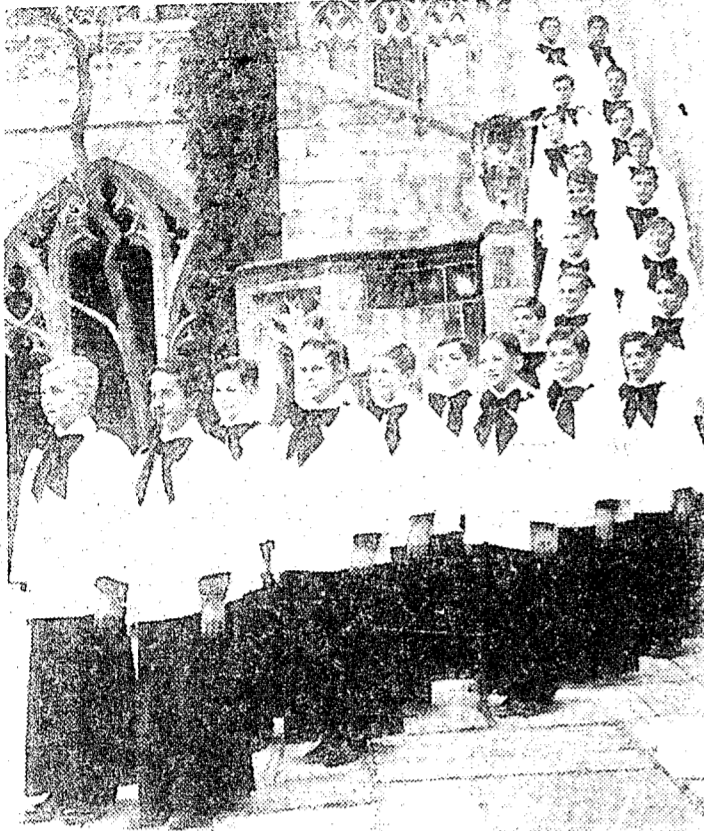

BLUFFTON, March 29—The nationally famous Apollo Boys' Choir is scheduled to appear on the Bluffton College Founders Hall stage at 8 p. m. Wednesday, April 4 as part of the Music-Lecture Series.

The choir is composed of 23 boys between the ages of 9 and 14. Chosen through competitive auditions the boys represent many states and denominations.

During the past 10 years the choir has filled over 1,000 engagements on Artist Courses, has appeared with several of the nation's leading symphony orchestras and over all major radio networks.

Coleman Cooper, founder and director of the choir, is one of the nation's foremost authorities on the training of pre-adolescent boys' voices. He has studied with teachers in both America and Europe.

## ONU Engineers Top In State

ADA, March 29—The Ohio Northern University student chapter of Ohio Society of Professional Engineers was voted the best chapter in the state and was awarded a plaque at the annual state OSPE convention held recently in Dayton.

This is the second straight win for the ONU chapter.

A committee of professional engineers was appointed to judge the merits of the eight student chapters in Ohio colleges, basing their decision on the activity and quality of work done by the students in the past year.

Two points of top rank were their extensive observation of Engineers Week in February and their 100 per cent student membership in the organization.

The Ohio Northern chapter is the only one in the state and nation to hold this latter record.

The awarding of this plaque originated only last year. Ohio Northern has had its name engraved on the brass plate twice consecutively and the students are aiming to retain this top position and eventually make the plaque their permanent possession.

## New Salary Schedule Approved By North Baltimore School Board

**\$4,600 Top Wage In Scale Starting At \$2,900 Minimum**

NORTH BALTIMORE, March 29—A salary schedule, ranging from a minimum of \$2,900 for a teacher with less than three years training and no experience, to \$4,600 for a teacher with a master's degree and three years experience, was adopted by the North Baltimore Board of Education at a special meeting Wednesday evening.

The schedule lists increments up to and including three years experience. It will become effective Sept. 1.

The teacher, with less than three years training, will receive an annual increase of \$100. One, with three years training and no experience, will start at \$3,100 and will receive \$3,400 after three years.

Minimum salary for a teacher, with no experience and a bachelor's degree, will be \$3,600 and annual increases of \$200 will be given. For the holder of a bachelor's degree with 30 additional semester hours of work and no experience, starting salary will be \$3,800 and annual increases of \$200.

Starting salary for a teacher, with no experience and holding a master's degree, will be \$4,000 and annual increases of \$200 will be made until the maximum of \$4,600 is granted.

Additional provisions of the salary schedule include 10 points. It states, "increments are not automatic but must be earned. Such increments will be recommended by the executive head, subject to approval of the board of education."

"The local board of education may grant additional salary to certificated employees on the basis of extra merit work, individual merit, expenses, and supply and demand."

"All certificated employees with less than a bachelor's degree must present nine semester hours or more each April 1 starting April 7, 1957 until the bachelor's degree is granted. Extenuating circumstances excepted."

"All certificated degree people will be required to present five semester hours of credit each three years or be ineligible for renewal."

In the regular March meeting, the Board of Education formally accepted Mr. White's letter of resignation, effective July 1, 1956, and at the same time appointed him to a position on the teaching staff in the local school.

Mr. White presented his letter of resignation to the board at the February meeting, but they asked that they be allowed additional time before taking any action upon the request.
