Bluffton May Get Mental Hospital

BLUFFTON — The Mennonite Central Committee, Akron, has been investigating various locations in the Middle Eastern section of the United States for their fourth mental hospital.

One of the places under consideration is Bluffton and for that purpose D. C. Kauffman, director of the East Central Mental Health Program met with various civic groups here recently.

Bluffton's village council, its businessmen's association, the Industrial Expansion Co. and Richland Township trustees all agreed to invite the mental hospital to locate here following their interview with Mr. Kauffman.

Mayor David L. Risser feels the hospital would be an asset to the community and other groups expressed similar views on the proposition.

Kauffman, a native of West Liberty, now living in Goshen, Ind. said he appreciated the welcome and the friendly attitude he found here but could make no promises as to the decision of the committee. A staff of 30 is usually needed to maintain the hospital.

The committee is considering other locations in Goshen and Ft. Wayne, Ind.

Hardin County Maps Road Work

KENTON — Hardin County engineer Harold Remsburg, announced today the road and bridge program in Hardin County will have approximately \$470,000 this summer spent on improvements planned by the Hardin County engineer's department.

Work was started Wednesday and painting and sandblasting of the 29 steel bridge structures in the county is the first project. The Smith Painting Company of Lima was awarded the contract for \$3,422.33.

The county highway program consists mainly of surface treating of about 115 miles of county roads. The county also plans to widen about 15 miles of roadway this year. The whole road program will consist of about 141 miles of improvement which will cost approximately \$383,292.
