Lions of MD13,

As this communication will reach you sometime during the Holiday Season, best wishes to you and your family and friends as you gather together in thanksgiving and celebration of all that has been given to you. Thank you so much for all you give back to those who are not as fortunate.

November has been an exciting month in MD13, and December promises to be equally productive and fun. We just completed an RLL2 Training Weekend at Salt Fork Lodge in Cambridge, Ohio. Lions representing all the districts in MD13 were in attendance, ranging from club members to a sitting International Director. We were blessed to have ID Ron Keller fly/flee from Iowa via Chicago/Columbus/Millersport during the wee hours Saturday night and early Sunday morning and appear for lunch and enlightenment Sunday afternoon in Salt Fork. At the other end of the Lions experience, Kevin Plummer of Logan Lions shared his first five months of Lions experience with a gathering that included three first vice district governors, a second vice district governor, a sitting DG, three FDI graduates, a few past council chairs, numerous zone chairs, a GLT, an MDS, PDG's, and moi! We investigated how we became Lions, the skills we had to offer MD13 and our local clubs and districts, identifying potential leaders, and how the multiple district worked and supported Lions work through the responsible use of dues and donations. GLT Chair PDG Jay Carey hopes to follow this training up early next Fall with an Emerging Lions Leadership Institute for current and aspiring club officers.

At the November Council of Governors Meeting, we had an excellent presentation from a representative of the Charitable Division of the Ohio Attorney General's Office. Her presentation was recorded and is currently being edited to possibly being offered as a YouTube program. Keep your eyes open for that unveiling. A tour of the Central Ohio Lions Eye Bank, which stores and provides corneal tissue for research and surgeries, was part of the day, as well as two fine dining experiences provided by the Eye Bank! At the meeting, the DG's voted to have Constitution and By-Laws frame two motions; one to eliminate the International Relations Committee and a second to promote the New Voices Platform. These would be considered at the February CoG Meeting and could be offered for approval at the State Convention in May. In her monthly meeting, PCC Kerry Parker reported Service Projects reported to MyLions rose from 46% of our clubs to over 70%, in part due to the Fall into Service Campaign. Let's continue to work on letting folks at all levels of society, Lions and non-Lions, know about the good things we do. As I write this report, we are +10 in membership growth for the current Lions Year, but clubs should be looking to their non-participating and non-paying members this month finding ways to help them continue as contributing members of our organization. At the Salt Fork Training highlighted earlier in this message, providing mentoring and training, both of new and existing members, was offered as one way we can do a better job of retention. While we have added almost 400 new members this year, seeing a growth of +10 only takes a little simple math to see we have lost nearly 390. PCC Kenny Schuck's Global Membership Team is about ready to unveil a program to promote membership growth. We have one new club, three in the works, and at least two potential branch clubs being investigated in MD13 at this time. The goal set for us by the International is 918 new members and 8 new clubs. We are barely beyond one third of our Lions Year. We can make this happen, folks!

Check out ohiolions.org, our state website, for information on the Winter Retreat and the Spring Convention Season. Those who attended the recent RLLI Training will tell you how much fun it is to gather with Lions from across our districts and state, sharing fellowship, training, and service ideas. Having attended Cabinet Meetings in all our districts, five STEPS walks, a handful of charter nights, and other local Lion events, I can say with confidence that we have an outstanding organization in MD13 of which we can be proud to say we are a member. MD13 Lions are being recognized outside our state boundaries as well. PID Steve Sherer is Chairman for the 2024 USA/Canada Forum in Louisville, Lion Tamarra Parker-Stephens was the feature speaker in the October Meeting of the Regional GAT, Lion Robert Borger is the alternate for Leo Liaison in CA1, and ID Ron Keller is Chairman of the Lions International Membership Committee. Congratulations!

Let's serve, let's grow, and let's have fun in the process.

Series Part 7: A Changing Environment

Communities known for their arts and entertainment are now also known for their environmental efforts. Community gardens provide food, a place for people to share their gardening knowledge, and bridge the social/economic gap. It is a place where residents that are under served can build a piece of self reliance by growing the food that goes to their tables.

For example: In Albany New York, LCIF and Anthem Foundation partnered committed to improving public health. the Lions of the community started a blueberry orchard which is run by Lion Greg Sheldon. It is called Alban Victory Gardens. Two hundred bushes were planted that attracted pollinators, improve air quality and puts food on the table.

Not only is food an issue, but water shortages are unprecedented. Up to 50% "of the basins supplying most US fresh water could fail to meet demand starting in 2071." Global temperature has risen by 8.1F which impacts the US by \$5208 annually. Over 110 million people live in countries with unhealthy pollution levels. The good news is that energy saved making products from recyclable materials is as follows: newspaper-40%, plastic-70% and glass-40%.

Global impact is this: when the temperature goes up, GOP goes down; 500 million people live in areas affected from erosion due to climate change; and air pollution has killed 7 million people.

What can Lions do? They can secure funding from matching grants for construction and equipment, district and club community impact grants for projects and LEO service grants for LEO projects. As you can see each one of us can help curb the problem. Act now Lions!

District Hunger Project

Once you have chosen and completed your club's Hunger Project, remember to report your service to LCI, and then send a picture with a brief description of the project to PCC/PDG Lion Dave Stockum. Lion Dave has graciously volunteered to put together a slide show of these activities to be shown at the OH1 District Convention in April. If you want to send in other pictures of your club's activities, these may be included as well. Time to let your club shine!



Dr. Kollarits Honored With 2023 Goerlich Award



In 1984 The Sight Center Board of Trustees created the John Goerlich Distinguished Service Award to be given annually to a person who has unselfishly served the blind and visually impaired communities. The Award is named for Mr. John Goerlich whose substantial personal and philanthropic contributions have allowed The Sight Center to flourish for many years.

While nominees must satisfy at least one of several criteria, Dr. Carol Kollarits was selected this centennial year for having satisfied ALL of them, including:

- Significant contributions to the cause of sight preservation.
- Outstanding service to the blindness and low-vision community
- Creating opportunities to improve the well-being of blind or low-vision individuals
- Significant financial or tangible contributions to The Sight Center and its mission
- Dr. Kollarits has dedicated her entire adult life to vision preservation and serving the blind and low-vision communities with her time, treasure, and substantial talents.

Northwest Ohio Lions Eye Care Foundation, Inc. (NWOLECF)

Application Changes & An Outcome of the Changes

Last year, NWOLECF was able to purchase 2 Amigo Handheld CCTV units thanks to a grant from LCIF that was made possible by donations from clubs throughout our district. We cannot thank you enough for making that possible.

In August of this year, NWOLECF made a change to the application process that requires anyone needing a CCTV unit to have an evaluation by a sight center prior to NWOLECF accepting the application. In most cases, that evaluation may be coordinated through The Sight Center of Northwest Ohio because they are they closest one in Ohio. There is one near Cleveland and one in the Cincinnati area as well.

In August, we received a request for a CCTV from an Allen County, Ohio resident. She became our first applicant to have an evaluation through The Sight Center of Northwest Ohio in Toledo – and they visited her home since she was unable to get to Toledo. What happened? Tara from The Sight Center determined that a handheld unit would work best for this individual, provided NWOLECF with that information, we approved placing a unit, and we set up a time for Tara to spend time at that home (not the same day as the evaluation). PDG Don Wiechart and I were also there to deliver an Amigo handheld unit for Tara to train this individual. Tara also shared other resources available through The Sight Center. The applicant liked the large calendar that is available and truly really enjoys the books-on-tape unit that she was able to receive.
