


Communications from DGE Don Wiechart

State Band Committee — Proposal up for vote at the State Convention to eliminate the State Band Committee

As you are probably aware, there is a proposal up for vote at the state convention to eliminate the State Band Committee. I would encourage you to vote against this proposal. One of the reasons given is that the "current practices of the Band Committee can be overseen by various other committees". While this may be technically true, the Band Committee is revitalizing itself and we feel that we are best suited to perform these duties. Moving these duties to another state committee will just add to their burden. The Band Committee has spent time this year evaluating what has been the existing model for parade representation and have come up with a new model that we feel will be successful.

Under the current model, students throughout the state make up the band. There have been difficulties with the model over the last several years:

Lack of interest by students to participate and/or band directors

Usually poor instrumentation due to the small size, which does not represent Ohio Lions in a positive manner Fund raising to participate in the band is up to the individual participant and the local Lions Club

Hiring of a band director that is willing to work during the summer for stipend allotted

Band Committee is responsible for securing rehearsal/activities facilities, student activities, and housing during band camp

Students may have to travel several hours to rehearse

Band Committee is responsible for all travel arrangements, including transportation, meals, hotel, liability insurance, chaperones, uniforms, music, etc

The proposed model is to set up an audition process to select an Ohio high school band to represent Ohio Lions at international conventions. After marching in the parade, the Band Committee will donate a predetermined amount to the high school band. There are many positives to this model:

Band Committee fund raising activities will be focused towards raising a set, stable amount.

Travel expenses for the selected band will be the responsibility of the high school band, as well as expenses for housing, meals, uniforms, liability insurance, and chaperones. Ohio Lions involvement would be limited to the parade day.

Rehearsals and preparation would be responsibility of the selected band.

Since the band selected comes from an audition process, the quality of the band representing Ohio Lions should be first class.

Clubs can still support the Ohio Lions Band either at the state level, or if their local high school band is selected, may support and promote them in their fund-raising activities.

Band directors may show more interest due to the donated amount. Most high school bands take trips once every 4 years and are looking for opportunities such as this. It is to their advantage to be the selected band and know they will be earning a set amount for their band program. (This is currently a common practice for high school bands.)

The Band Committee feels that this new proposal is a positive move and show that we can evolve with current practices to best represent Ohio Lions during the International Convention. There is still work to be done in setting up the audition process, getting communication to high school bands, and a number of smaller items. Please vote to keep the State Band Committee.

In a recent email, District 41 LCIF Coordinator PDG Bruce Jellison writes:

The Lion Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) Campaign 100 Leadership Team Members have informed me of the seriousness of the flooding in the mid-west. The mid-west (especially Nebraska) is experiencing unprecedented flooding. Lives have been lost and thousands are homeless and have lost everything. You can be assured your foundation, LCIF will be sending thousands of dollars to Lions in this area to help with the recovery.

Disasters are now happening back to back, PLEASE help your LCIF help those in distress by making a donation now. If you have not made a donation to your LCIF this year, this is the time to do it. All donations are tax deductible and may count towards naming a Melvin Jones Fellow and toward your Campaign 100 pledge. A donation of only \$100 goes a long way. (one time or only \$10 a month). In the past few weeks, several of our constitutional areas have experienced devastating tragedy. Catastrophic floods are overwhelming the central United States and parts of Mozambique, Malawi, and Zimbabwe.

In the US, hundreds of levees were breached and entire towns have been destroyed. The land and the farmers whose livelihood depends on it are devastated. In Nebraska alone, livestock and crops losses are expected to reach \$1 billion. It will likely take years to recover from this disaster.

In the days immediately following the disaster, LCIF awarded five Emergency grants totaling US\$50,000. The gravity of the situation has become more apparent, and your foundation has responded with another US\$50,000 Major Catastrophe grant for all affected regions.

In Mozambique, Malawi, and Zimbabwe, thousands of people are missing in the wake of Cyclone Idai. The death toll cannot even be estimated right now. Residents of these countries are in dire need of food, water, medical supplies, shelter and sanitation.

To assist local Lions in their relief efforts, LCIF initially awarded two US\$10,000 Emergency grants. As the devastating effects of this disaster have become more apparent, your Foundation has responded again with a US\$50,000 Major Catastrophe grant for the affected countries.

We are only able to offer ... assistance because of your generous support.

PERRYSBURG SUNRISE March 30th, Two bags and a box of eyeglasses were picked up from two locations. March 28th 2 boxes and 3 bags of eyeglasses were picked up from 3 locations.

KENTON On March 28th , a Lion collected 40 eyeglasses from Dr. Warrner's office., and on March 25th a Lion collected 250 eyeglasses from Goodwill in Kenton

ADA March 27th Purchased Glasses for local resident

FINDLAY March 25th One eye case was reviewed, Application Incomplete. No action taken. 9 Pairs of Reading Glasses were dispensed during the month of March.

SYLVANIA SUNRISE March 14th 630 eyeglasses were picked up this month.

PERRYSBURG SUNRISE March 7th Eyeglasses were picked up from 4 locations and a large bag was left on our porch. They were sorted to determine usable or damaged. Damaged glasses and unneeded cases are donated to VOSH to be sold for the value of the materials and the funds used for missions. Usable glasses are sorted and will be used for our annual Alabama vision mission to Mexico. Altogether, 4 boxes of eyeglass cases and 1 box of glasses were donated and delivered to VOSH. Also, PDG Craig stayed and packed glasses with part of the mission team for the Aug/Sep VOSH Mission trip to Romania.

MC COMB March 7th Club member assisted with packing eyeglasses in Pandora, Ohio to be shipped to Romania for VOSH (Volunteer Optometric Services to Humanity) mission trip this upcoming September.

RIVERDALE COMMUNITY March 5th We have collected 86 pairs of glasses in the past month or two. We continue to have donation boxes in each of our 3 communities.

PORTAGE March 3rd We have collected 670 eyeglasses the last 3 months. They are boxed and ready for donation to VOSH.

ARCHBOLD We heard from a member who helped with an eye care program through their professional optometrist group. It was held in Delaware Ohio and she is looking into the possibilities of bringing the program to FultonCounty/Northwest Ohio.

Hunger Relief

PERRYSBURG March 17th 3 bags of food were donated to the Food Pantry at Maumee United Methodist Church, then on March 24th 2 bags of food were donated to the pantry, and finally on March 31st, 9 bags of food and home products were donated.

PERRYSBURG SUNRISE Provided Soup Kitchen assistance on March 6th and again on March 20th. On each date two members at two separate locations prepared and served food at local soup kitchens

WAUSEON March 28th Our Lions Club provided the meal for our Community's weekly "Community Meal". Our Club prepared the meal and served 96 meals to those in our community. We were also in charge of cleanup. This weekly "Community Meal" is held at a local church that allows different organizations to host and prepare the meal as a community outreach for those in need of a meal.

CRIDERSVILLE Fundraising Event March 14th we have a spaghetti dinner to raise funds for our club with 1/2 of sales going to the local food pantry

PERRYSBURG SUNRISE Humane Society Hunger Relief March 25th 9 bags of dog food were donated.

WAUSEON Wauseon Elementary School Project reported on March 19th Our club bought food items for the Wauseon Elementary School backpack project. This project helps provide food for students to take home during the week and weekend so that these students have food to eat. These students would otherwise may go without food due to their home situations.

PORTAGE March 9th the Portage Lions club now publishes the monthly Village newsletter, the Nitty Gritty. This is a joint venture with the Village Council, Christ United Methodist Church and the Portage Lions Club. All groups and organizations within the Village are encourage to submit articles. The primary function of the newsletter is to keep the Village residents informed of news and events happening in the Village.

OTTOVILLE March 5th Ottoville Lions club donated \$250 to the local Ottoville, Ohio Library toward the purchase of New Children's Books for the Library. They also made a donation to the Ottoville High School after Prom(Post Prom) to help with gift cards/gifts for students attending prom, and to the Ottoville Mother's Club Annual 5K event to help the Ottoville Local Schools Community.

SPENCERVILLE Lions Cheer Club March 7th The club sent cards to the two Cheer Club recipient at Roselawn Manor. This month of March 2019 was Betty Place
