Membership is critical! Annual inflation and rising costs have increased the costs to operate. Just like we see in our businesses or household budgets, there is less purchasing power available in our current economy and around the world. And, like our business or home budget, we need to do something different to continue our work. Lions International has proposed a small annual increase in International dues in order to ensure that Lions Clubs International meets the needs of its members. The proposal includes a \$2 increase per year to the current \$50 dues beginning in 2028 and spread out over 5 years. So by 2032 dues will be adjusted to \$60. Other "service businesses" like Rotary are currently \$82, which does not include insurance or the magazine. Kiwanis Club members pay \$77, which again, does not include their magazine or insurance coverage. A dues adjustment will help meet our rising costs so we can maintain the level of support our clubs and our service require, including programs, initiatives and technologies that enhance our impact, membership and service. This resolution has been approved by the Board and will be voted on by the Lion members designated as official convention delegates in attendance at the 2026 International Convention in Hong Kong. So be aware of this possible change coming. Your club may need, in this economy, to also adjust current club dues. So bring in lots of new members to allow us to continue our community work more effectively.

*Clubs must be proactive, not reactive to be successful.

*Bring ENERGY to your club: put service projects ads in store windows, call members when they don't attend a meeting, wear a Lions shirt every Wednesday.

*Clubs are a business: legally operate like one.

*For next year's Peace Poster contest, please have your clubs send the winning poster to the Gov. team, not to the Lion office.

Five Tips for Growth:

1. Do projects that matter. Find ways to do meaningful service while bringing people together and having fun.
2. Celebrate your wins. Share your achievements proudly. Your success stories can inspire others to join you.
3. Show the Lions experience. Help your community see that being a Lion is so much more than volunteering.
4. Be welcoming. Create an inclusive environment where everyone feels heard and valued
5. Just ask! A personal invitation is often all it takes to bring in a new member.

One of the new recommendations from LCI this year is that all clubs designate a Safety Officer to review each club activity from a safety standpoint and identify potential hazards. A self-inspection checklist is available from Lions Clubs International. All steps should be taken to reduce liability. Non-recommended activities include fireworks displays or sales, dunk tanks, tractor or truck pulls, snowmobile, go-kart, skateboard, and other races. Following club elections is a good time to implement this recommendation.

Students in SEL programs increase academic performance up to 11%. In 2018, New Yorks State Department of Education made mental health education a required curriculum component. Recognizing the critical importance of the subject for both students and teachers, schools began offering Lions Quest - Lions Clubs International Foundations signature social and emotional learning program. Communities heard about the district's success with educating students and teachers on stress, peer pressure, bullying, and other impacts on mental well-being. The district superintendent declared that social emotional development is as important as academic learning in preparing students for happy, productive, and resilient lives. Lions Quest is invaluable for teaching social emotional skills. The lessons are reinforced throughout the school day and apply to daily life.

There were 51 boxes of eyeglasses and eyeglass cases that were delivered to Volunteer Optometric Services to Humanity (VOSH), which is in Pandora, OH. They will dismantle the unusable glasses to recycle the metal and plastic.

The income from these efforts goes to pay for administrative costs of hosting a Vision Mission trip. All missionaries pay their own way to participate in these endeavors.

Eyeglasses are given for free to mission clients. They receive an eye screening, glasses (if needed), sunglasses, and a cleaning cloth. Sometimes only reader glasses are needed. Other times, one really needs a prescription pair of glasses. We also identify some people who need eye surgery, cataracts and other situations. Another team goes to the mission city later to perform these surgeries.
